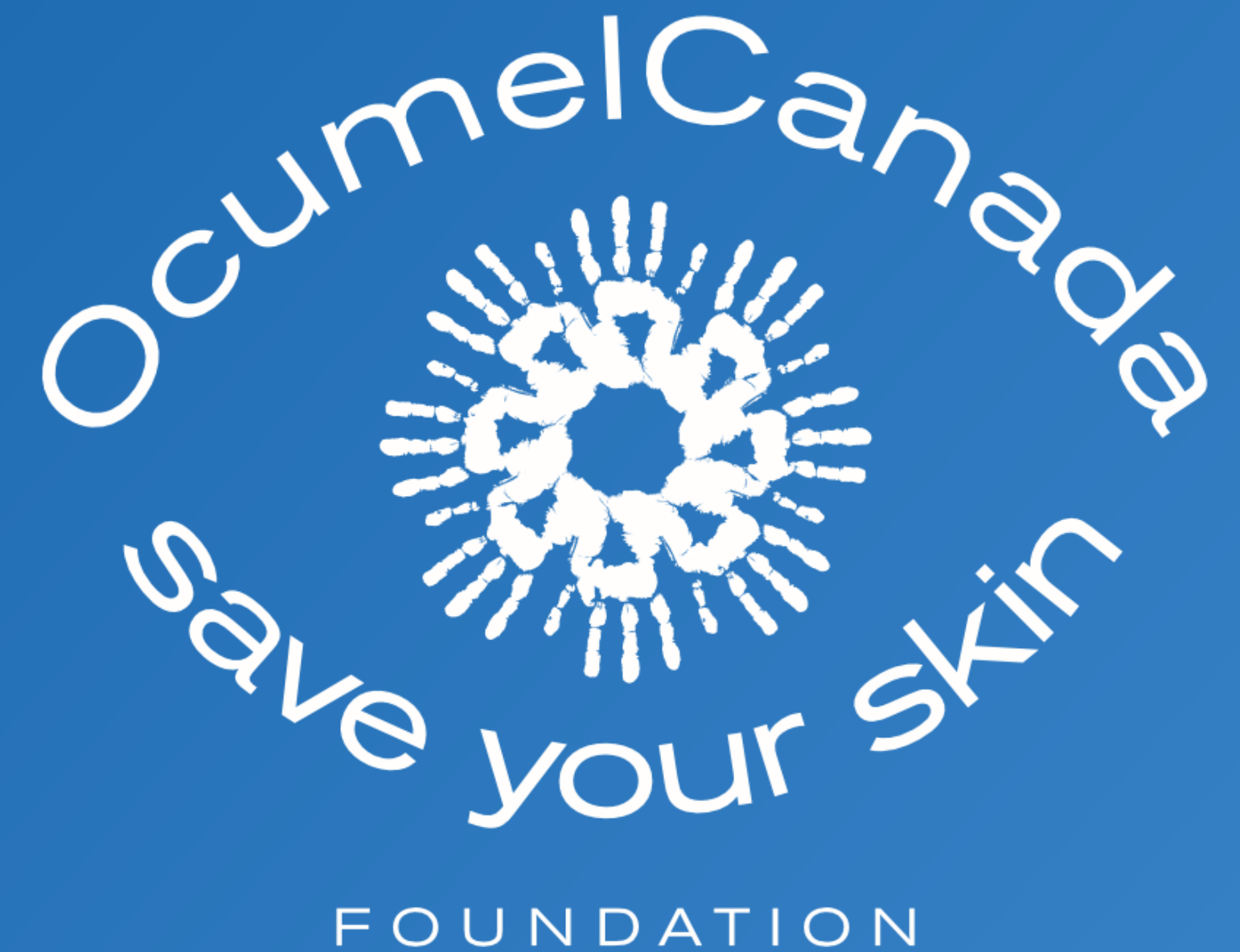

Ocular Melanoma Fact Sheet

There is an urgent need to increase awareness and improve the diagnosis of ocular melanoma.

Melanoma is a cancer that begins in the melanocytes, the pigment producing cells in the body.

Melanoma can occur on the skin, in the digestive tract, in the spinal cord, in the eye and even in the genitals.

Ocular (uveal) melanoma, or melanoma of the eye, is the most common form of eye cancer in adults.

Unlike cutaneous melanoma, or melanoma of the skin, ocular melanoma is not thought to be related to sun exposure.

Risk factors for ocular melanoma include light skin, light hair, light eyes and there is a slight male prevalence.

The uveal tract is the pigmented layer of the eye that includes the iris, ciliary body and the choroid.

Approximately 200 Canadians are diagnosed with ocular melanoma each year.

Most ocular melanomas are diagnosed by an optometrist or an ophthalmologist during an eye exam, making it important to have regular eye exams.

Eye tumours such as uveal melanoma are often small and may not be treated with radiation therapy.

Removal of the eye is the best option for some patients.

Ocular melanoma can spread to other organs in the body. When it spreads to the liver, it is often fatal.

Before the primary diagnosis, it is important to have a biopsy of the tumour to confirm the diagnosis.

Currently, there is no cure for ocular melanoma.

Questions to Ask Your Doctor - Primary Disease

Informed and Empowered Ocular Melanoma Patients Live Longer, Better Lives.

There are a few specialists you may encounter, and you should know the difference between those specialists when choosing which will be best suited for your treatment plan.

Primary Eye Tumour Related Questions:

- What is ocular melanoma and how does it differ from cutaneous (skin) melanoma?
- What are the dimensions of the tumour? Diameter? Height? Thickness? What do they mean for treatment options?
- Can I receive a written report with this information?

Treatment Questions:

- What are my treatment options and what are the differences? Are there different options or treatment centres that I should know about?
- Which treatment do you think is best for me and why?
- What type of radiation treatments do you offer?
- Do I need to have my eye removed?
- How many OM patients have you treated?
- Are there different outcomes depending on the different treatments?

<p>OM is rare, affecting approximately five in a million people; about 200 cases are diagnosed per year in Canada. Like other melanomas, it begins in melanocytes – the cells that produce the pigment melanin. Also referred to as uveal melanoma, 90% of primary OM develops in the choroid.</p> <p>Uveal Melanoma - The uvea is a three-layered part of the eye. It is made up of the choroid, iris and ciliary body. 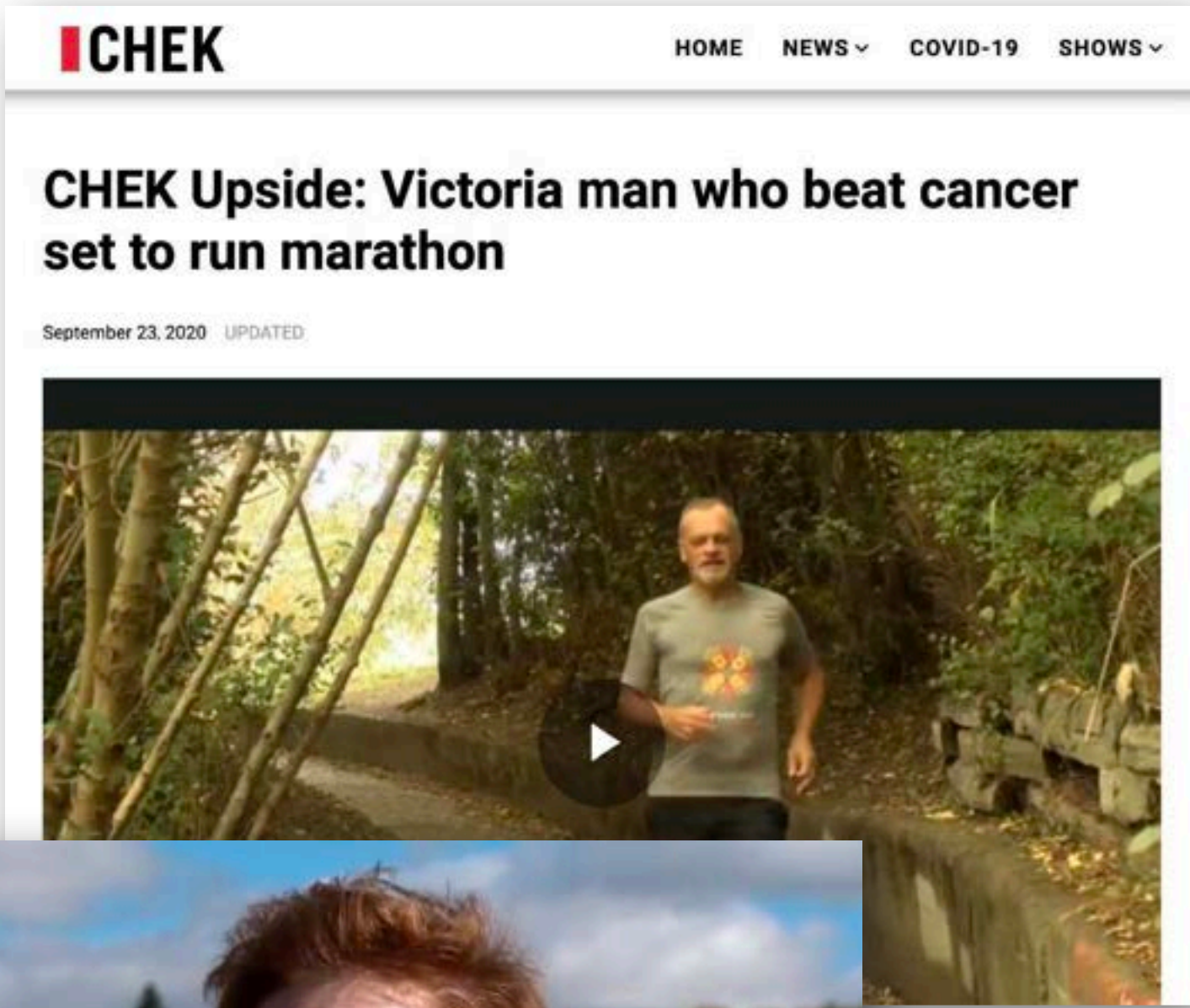

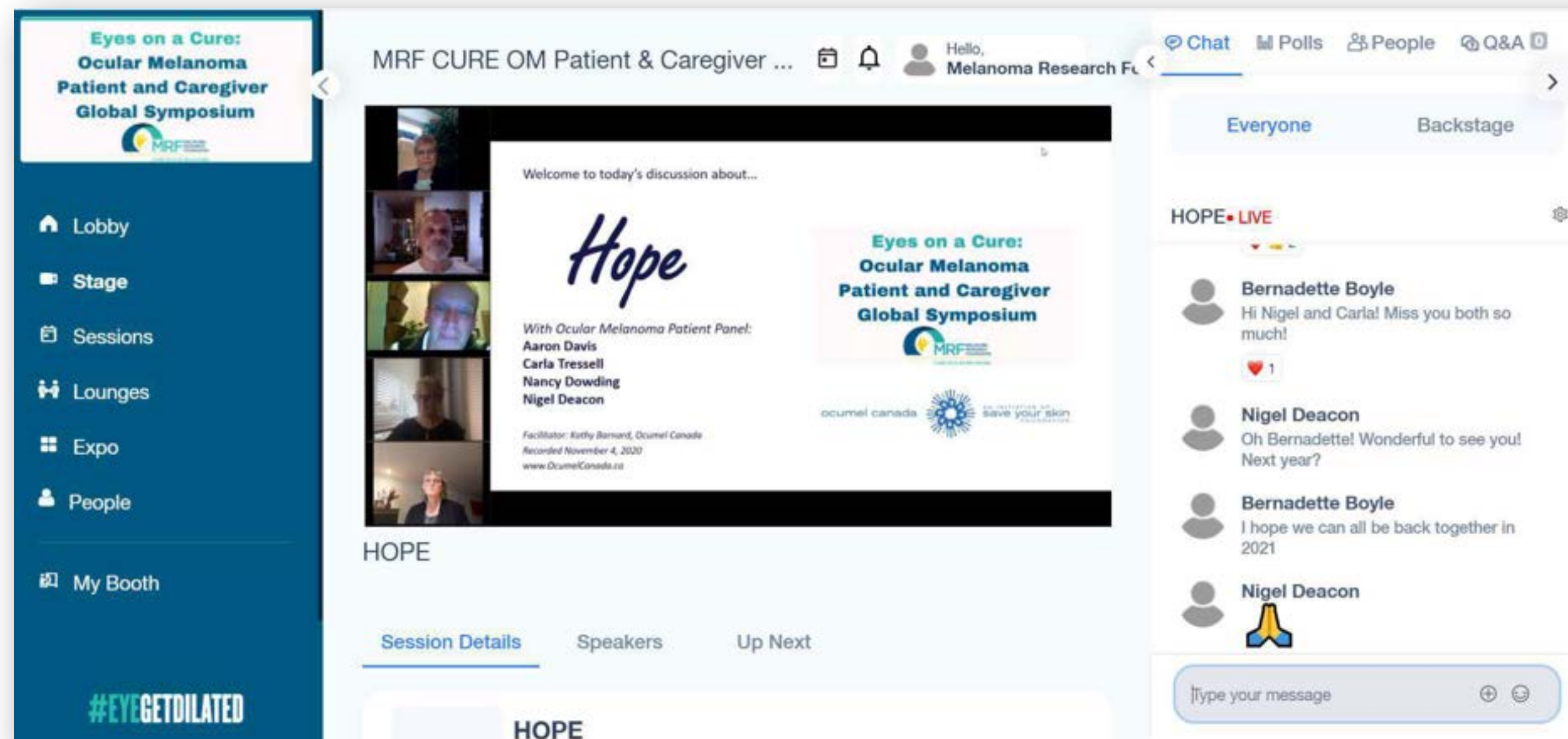

"It had been two years since my last regular eye exam with my optometrist. I started to notice what I called milky spots, (white flashes), floating across my vision when I closed my eyes to go to sleep. I didn't think much of them until they presented more frequently and I had experienced sharp pain in my right eye a couple of times. I decided it would be wise to make an appointment with my optometrist. During my exam, I told my optometrist about the white flashes. He suggested that I have a digital image taken of my eyes.

We took the images and then when he viewed them he was concerned about what he saw. He showed me the image of my right eye and I could see a mass that very clearly shouldn't have been there. That was the beginning of my diagnosis of Ocular Melanoma.

I was treated four months later with brachytherapy of the right eye. The plaque filled with radiated seeds was placed at the back of my right eye and remained there for one week. The surgeries for placement and removal of the plaque were successful and so began the slow process of the tumour shrinking and dying. I have lost clear vision in my right eye but am grateful that my eye could be preserved.

I know now that the white flashes and pain I experienced was my retina detaching due to the fluid leaking from the tumour. I encourage everyone I talk to about my diagnosis to get a yearly eye exam that includes dilation and to never ignore any changes in vision."

"CANCER. The word strikes fear into the hearts of millions, but most people have never heard of eye cancer. I certainly had not, until January 30, 2017. Around that time, I had started to notice white "flashes" in my left eye. I decided to visit my optometrist to get his advice. At my appointment, he noticed something of concern and referred me to a retina specialist the following week. My eyes were thoroughly examined, including a dilated eye exam, and at the end of a long visit, the ophthalmologist sat me down and told me that there was a melanoma tumour in my eye – I had cancer.

I was referred to an ocular oncologist and a flurry of activity ensued. Just five weeks later, I had brachytherapy treatment, which involved a radiated "plaque" being surgically attached to my eye at the tumour site for five days. The treatment was successful, and over time, the tumour has shrunk and died. As a result of the radiation, I have lost clear vision in my eye, but I am grateful that my eye could be preserved.

Ocular melanoma is a rare and dangerous cancer. Even with successful brachytherapy treatment, more than 50% of patients have metastasis. If this happens, there is no effective treatment available. The risk of metastasis is lower for smaller tumours, so early detection is very important.

Nearly four years after my diagnosis, I am profoundly grateful that I have remained healthy. I've made it my mission to raise awareness about the importance of eye health. I urge everyone to get a regular dilated eye exam and to pay attention to any changes in vision. Your life could depend on it."
